Besufort County Council built the \$400,000 Leroy E. Browne Services Center In 1977 with monies from the Economic Development Administration. It was leased by the comprehensive health services as a satellite clinic for health care delivery.

Penn Center will co-sponsor the dedication. The center was a leading force during the Civil Rights movement of the 1960s and played an important role in Browne's first election.

While he announced early this year he won't be seeking re-election, county council voted to name the St. Helena building in his honor before the decision was made public.
