## CHC gets \$739,000 fed grant

MIDDLETOWN

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MIDDLETOWN — A citybased agency will be receiving a federal grant to provide health and medical services to individuals in area homeless shelters.

The Community Health Center Inc. was awarded a \$739,000 grant

from the Department of Health and Human Services to start a new program to serve the homeless, U.S Rep. Rosa DeLauro, D-3, announced Tuesday.

The funding, which the CHC will receive in December, will be used to launch a program called "WYA" or "Wherever You Are" that will create six access points to provide primary and preventative medical services to the homeless in shelters in Middletown, New Britain and Meriden, CHC spokesman Dwight Blint said.

"Providing the poor and underserved with medical services they typically would not be able to access is a moral responsibility of government," DeLauro said. "This funding will give CHC the resources necessary to provide primary and preventative medical services to homeless in our communities."

The Community Health Center's grant was one of 105 being awarded nationwide —

and one of the largest—by the federal health department, Blint said.

The grants, totaling more than \$63 million, help an estimated 632,000 people, including many without health insurance, to obtain primary and preventative health care services.

"The needs of the homeless in the area of health care are quite significant, and this will go a long way to help us to reach that population and to ease their plight," CHC chief executive officer Mark Masselli said. The Community Health Center Inc. is one of the state's largest providers of medical, dental, and mental health care to the uninsured, underinsured, working poor and pub-
