Community-based clinics like the Sixteenth Street Community Health Center offer quality primary health care in a setting that is more convenient and costeffective than a hospital. The general relief medical program could be revised by requiring recipients to go to community clinics for their primary care, saving the county and state money. Based on the state's own data, the cost of an average patient visit at Doyne Hospital is \$551. The cost per visit at Sixteenth Street center averages \$60.
