



Nineteen ninety four was both

prosperous and exciting for the Sixteenth Street Community
Health Center. In April, Secretary of Health and Human Services
Donna Shalala helped us celebrate the completion of our new expanded facility. The expansion added more patient exam rooms, a new lab, increased office space for staff, and allowed our Women, Infants and Children (WIC)
Program to be brought on-site.

The additional space has also allowed the Sixteenth Street Community Health Center

to initiate new innovative programs which increase the quality of care offered to our clients. The development of our Immunization Outreach Program and opening of the Office of Environmental Health are two examples of new programs that began in 1994.

NATIONAL MODEL

"The Sixteenth Street Community Health Center is a community-based public/private partnership which serves as a national model for health care reform efforts." Federal officials, like Health and Human Services Secretary Donna Shalala, quoted above, have nationally recognized the Sixteenth Street Community Health Center for its innovative approach to fulfilling the diverse health and human service needs of the residents living in our surrounding community. For more than 25 years, our Center has been providing quality, cost-effective health care to clients who have no other access to services due to the difficult economic, cultural, and linguistic barriers that they face.





Pric, a six- year-old Hispanic boy, has been an ongoing patient of Sixteenth Street. He was diagnosed with epilepsy and is followed by our pediatric case manager and pediatricians. Eric is also treated by a neurologist at Children's Hospital because of his condition. Recently, he complained of stomach pains, and suffered from a major seizure. Eric was given a CAT scan and a large abnormality was discovered in his brain. The abnormality was originally diagnosed as a brain tumor. However, Sixteenth Street pediatricians felt it may be a brain abscess, as opposed to the more serious tumor diagnosis. His brain abscess was confirmed through a follow up CAT scan. Surgery was performed on Eric to drain the abscess and he is in full recovery. Eric continues to be followed by our medical professionals.


Reflecting our surrounding neighborhood, our patient population

17% White, 7% South East Asian
and 4% African American.





Por many years, Kayoua and her family lived in a small village in Laos with no access to health care. In 1990, Kayoua, age 40, together with her husband and three children moved from the refugee camps in Thailand to Milwaukee's near south side. When Kayoua was pregnant with her fourth child, she came to Sixteenth Street Community Health Center. At her initial medical visit, with the help of the clinic's Hmong translator, the doctor diagnosed her with a number of health problems, including hepatitis, low iron and diabetes. Throughout the remainder of her pregnancy, Kayoua received WIC services and continued to be followed closely by the clinic's medical providers, perinatal case managers and social workers. Gradually, her energy level and weight returned to normal which resulted in the birth of a healthy baby girl. Today, Kayoua along with her husband and four children, continue to receive ongoing health services at the Sixteenth Street Community Health Center. She is eternally grateful to the clinic for her improved health.







Due to the diverse cultural backgrounds of our clients, our staff must work together as a team in order to fulfill each patient's specialized health care needs. Our providers have learned how to treat diseases and medical conditions that other health providers may never encounter.

To serve the linguistic needs of our client base, we offer services in English, Spanish, Hmong and Laotian. Seventy percent of our staff is bilingual in Spanish and English, and on-site translators are available in Hmong and Laotian.

In addition to linguistic barriers, our clients face a variety of economic challenges. Approximately 70% of our clients have incomes below the poverty level. Common problems associated with poverty include poor housing conditions, lack of health insurance, environmental health hazards, poor nutrition, crime and violence. Working together, our staff serves as advocates for families in our neighborhoods, providing them with appropriate treatment, support and referrals.

PROGRAMS

The Sixteenth Street Community Health Center offers a wide array of essential health and human services to our culturally diverse clientele. Our programs include: Primary Health Care, Health Education, Social Services, Case Management, Women, Infants & Children Program, School-Based Health Services and Environmental Health Services. Individuals and families can fulfill virtually all of their health and human service needs at our facility. All services are provided in the client's primary language.

PRIMARY HEALTH CARE



The Center provides Primary Health Care Services in five

different medical specialties including: pediatrics, family practice, internal medicine, obstetrics and gynecology. Hospital care is provided through St. Mary's Hospital, Children's Hospital and Sinai Samaritan.

HEALTH EDUCATION PROGRAM



Our Health Education Program focuses on empowering individuals to make intelligent decisions about their health. Health information is received through one-on-one sessions and group classes. Some of the health issues addressed are nutrition, family planning, reproductive health, prenatal care, breastfeeding and parenting.

SOCIAL SERVICES

The Social Services Department provides a variety of services to assist individuals and families in dealing with serious social, mental health and medical assistance issues. Through one-on-one counseling, treatment, support groups and outside agency referrals, problems such as

CASE MANAGEMENT AND OUTREACH SERVICES



All encompassing Case

Management and Outreach

Services are provided to pregnant women, HIV positive individuals and children who are chronically ill. Our case managers provide specialized care, constant follow-up and outreach to all of our high-risk clients. For parents with their first baby, outreach workers from our First Time Parent Program conduct follow-up home visits to promote healthy family growth and development.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH SERVICES



Our Office of Environmental Health identifies area environmental health hazards which affect local residents,

specifically lead and asbestos.

We offer screening, education and treatment of the illnesses that are related to the identified environmental hazards.

SCHOOL-BASED WELLNESS CENTER



The School-Based Wellness
Center is located at Milwaukee's
South Division High School and
is a satellite clinic of the Sixteenth
Street Community Health Center.
The Wellness Center provides
South Division students with
referrals, health care, screenings,
sports physicals, immunizations,
pregnancy testing and STD testing.
In addition, the center offers
services and referrals that help
students with social and mental
health problems.




