

OneWorld, One Promise



In late 2010 OneWorld Chief Executive Officer Andrea Skolkin announced plans to expand current services and create a primary healthcare and affordable housing campus at the Livestock Exchange Building.

Even though OneWorld cared for 21,343 patients in 2010, more than 500 patients each month must be told that we do not have an appointment opening. "The demand for services continues to grow, therefore we must continue to grow" Skolkin said.

Funding sources for the project include a \$8.9 million dollar grant from the US Department of Health and Human Services, Health Resources and Services Administration, Bureau of Primary Health Care, made available by the Affordable Care Act. Additional funding has been obtained through the Nebraska Investment Financing Agency and Midwest Housing Equity Low Income Tax Credit program, the City of Omaha and philanthropy.

Construction will begin once the government approves the Environmental Assessment. Each building includes 32,000 square feet of clinic space on the first two floors and two additional floors of affordable senior housing and underground parking for tenants. The South building will house a Women's Health Center. The North building will expand the "quick sick clinic" (OneWorld's minor urgent care), and specialty care clinical area that will increase volunteerism. In addition, the Livestock Exchange Building will undergo a renovation with expanded Women, Infant and Children clinic space and equipment upgrades.

OneWorld recognizes that one of the keys to health is access to safe, healthy housing. Studies have shown a shortage of affordable senior housing in South Omaha and OneWorld is taking a step toward addressing this need by including affordable housing in the project.

The expansion project will boost economic benefits for the community. It is estimated 160 construction jobs will be added along with 120 full-time health care positions within five years. Over time health care will be provided for an additional 12,000 patients. The buildings are being built using "green" design principles and will promote an intergenerational living environment.

Once the project is complete in 2013, and at full capacity OneWorld will be able to provide care for over 33,000 patients through 120,000 primary medical, dental and behavioral health appointments.

In late 2010, OneWorld Community Health Centers, in partnership with Building Bright Futures and Omaha Public Schools, opened three School-Based Health Centers (SBHCs) in South Omaha at Indian Hill Elementary, Spring Lake Magnet Elementary and Liberty Elementary. The School-Based Health Centers provide on-site care for acute and chronic illness of school-aged children. From immunizations to school physicals, the clinics operate like our main facility allowing every patient the right to affordable, quality health care.
