- 1976: Founded by Vernon Dyer, volunteer Physician, at Mid America All Indian Center
- 1978 Moved to the an old strip mall at 2318 E. Central, Wichita, KS 67214, the site of our current facility
- 1980 Incorporated as the Wichita Urban Indian Health Center

Funded by the Indian Health Service as a Title V Urban Indian Health Program and Buy Indian Contractor, hired staff to expand medical services and add dental services

Relied on a short list of specialty physicians willing to provide services to our patients free of charge

- 1981 Began partnership with University of Kansas School of Medicine OB Residency Program at Wesley Medical Center to provide prenatal care on site, deliver babies at hospital and provide postnatal care on site.
- 1982 Began part-time Diabetes Specialty Clinic with volunteer services of Dr. Dianna Guthrie
- 1983 Began weekly outreach clinic at the La Familia Hispanic Senior Center
- 1984 Began receiving donated diagnostic services from a coalition of all hospitals in the Wichita Community via the Sedgwick County Association of the Medically Underserved (SCAMU)
- 1985 Changed name to The Hunter Health Clinic, Inc. after respected Indian elders, Jay and Vera Hunter.

Funded by the Public Health Service as a Community Health Center and expanded services to all people by hiring additional staff to provide medical, dental, interpreter, transportation services.

1987 Funded by the Public Health Service as a Stewart B. McKinney Health Care for the Homeless Center, expanding services to include mental health, inpatient detox services, street outreach, nurse rounds at all homeless shelters, homeless case management.

Began Blankets for Homeless program with the assistance of the Department of Defense, receiving first annual shipment of several thousand blankets.

Established Asian (Vietnamese) Outreach Program

1993 Began mental health therapy sessions on site at Central Clinic

Began HIV/AIDS Education Program for Indians funded by Indian Health Service

Began Pfizer Sharing the Care Prescription Drug Program, a voucher program for free medications, in partnership with Pfizer and Professional Pharmacy, growing to over \$1M per year in donated medications.

1999 Brookside Satellite Clinic designated as a Community Based Primary Care Clinic by Kansas Department of Health and Environment and expanded to full-time combining staff and volunteers. Expanded HIV/AIDS Outreach to Urban Indians and tribes in Kansas and Oklahoma with funding from the Wichita Community Foundation, US. Conference of Mayors and KDHE.

Began Nurse's clinic at Ti'Wiconi Safe Haven in partnership with Inter-Faith Ministries.

Began Pediatric Residency Program (University of Kansas School of Medicine-Wichita)

Established Registered Nurse Internship Program partnering with Winfield College

Began A/SA Group Sessions at Main Clinic and Venture House Satellite

Established Diabetes Foot Clinic with certified Diabetes Foot Specialist

Established Asian American/Pacific Islander Outreach Program (Cambodian, Laos, Thai) in partnership with Wichita Indo-Chinese Center.
