Community Health Center may soon have a new face, and in the process, the city could garner funds for the project from the \$787 million federal stimulus package.



Common council and commission member David Bauer was apprehensive about the project. He questioned whether it was the right thing to put at a gateway to the city and said he was opposed to pushing the plan through commissions too quickly.

"What we have at the local level is the politics of urgency when we can only give 30 days for an RFP," Bauer said, "I think the date set is way too abrupt, too aggressive, it's just going to add to the steam roller of the project."

Other commission members disagreed with his concerns.

"If we do it aggressively, 30 days is enough." Joseph Bibisi said.

Warner explained there was a reason to move so quickly.

"And the reality is, if you want to get stimulus funds from the governor, this is it," Warner said.

In the end, the commission approved the plan to solicit RFPs; Bauer was the only member
